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


Fig. 14—Armstrongs' Map Sheet Numbers. The Town Plan of Ayr appears on sheet 6.

All places in Ayrshire which are indicated on Armstrongs' Maps are given in Roman capitals with grid references. These grid references include the sheet number (see above), then an indication of the square in which the place is located, referring by letter first to the top or bottom of the map, secondly to the side. e.g., ALLOWAY, 3DF, is on Sheet 3, Square DF. After the grid reference is given the modern name (where known), followed by the parish. The Gazetteer thus forms, incidentally, an index to Armstrongs' Map. Places not mentioned on the Map, and cross-references, are given without Roman capitals.

PARISHES

The following population statistics are as printed in Stat. Acct. XX, 591, 592. The figures for 1755 were taken from Webster's Enumeration, published in extenso in Scottish Population Statistics, ed. J. G. Kyd, Scottish History Society, 1952; the 1951 figures, added for purposes of comparison, are from the Census Report. In the last column are given the page references to the parish accounts in the Statistical Account.

The parish of Newton-upon-Ayr did not come into existence till 1779, and the figure for 1755 is therefore as estimate, with appropriate amendment to that for Monkton and Prestwick (Stat. Acct., II, x.) The figures for the Cumbraes, since transferred to Bute, have been excluded. The modern parish of Ayr has included Newton and St. Quivox since 1895.

TOWNS AND VILLAGES

Sources: Statistical Account; local histories; etc. Modern communities which did not then exist as such are sometimes found under Estates, Farms, or natural features.

ALLOWAY, 3DF, hamlet in Ayr parish. Lands of Alloway belonging to Ayr Burgh sold 1754 (see p. 182 foll.). Parish conjoined with Ayr 1690, church re-roofed in 1786 to provide school-house. School at Alloway Mill closed 1765, various heads of families (including William Burnes) engaged tutor (John Murdoch). ALTON, 1ED, hamlet in Loudoun parish. Possibly established in 18th century by Earl of Loudoun, contained a few cotton weavers at the end of the century.

Ardrossan parish, v. Saltcoats.

AUCHENLECK, 4FE, Auchinleck, village. 340 inhabitants in 1791, having declined because of emigration to Catrine and Muirkirk; 5 shopkeepers, 1 baker, 6 masons, 2 hawkers, 8 shoemakers, 1 fiddler, 15 weavers, 1 stocking-weaver, 3 millers, 4 smiths, 2 coopers, 1 excise officer. Parish church repaired and enlarged 1754, aisle added by patron, laird of Auchinleck. Burgher and Anti-burgher seceders. Anti-burgher church at Wallacetown, later Rigg, outwith the town. Assessment £100 p.a.

for schoolmaster, 1764.

AYR, 3DE, royal burgh established 1203-1206, with about 2000 inhabitants in 1745, 3871 in 1791. Of the 9 Incorporated Trades there were, including masters, journeymen, and apprentices, 64 hammermen, 186 weavers, 12 dyers, 57 tailors, 135 squaremen, 62 shoemakers, 4 skinners, 22 coopers, 34 fleshers. Principal manufacturers, leather and soap (3 manufactories), some cotton weaving and tambouring. 36 retail shops, including 21 groceries, 4 hardware, 2 saddlery, 9 broad cloth and haberdashery. Market days: Tuesday and Friday; four fairs annually. Daily mail coach to Glasgow via Kilmarnock, diligence thrice weekly to Portpatrick. 33 vessels belonged to the port, 18 in foreign trade, 8 in coastal trade, 7 in fisheries. Parish church built 1654, patron of the 1st charge, the Crown, and of the 2nd charge, the Town Council and Kirk Session; also Moravians, Methodists and Episcopalians; Seceders met in Wallacetown. Grammar school with master for Latin and Greek, master for arithmetic, bookkeeping, navigation, geometry, two writing masters; also 2 English schools with masters, one built 1746, replaced by two in 1773; all maintained by burgh, and succeeded by new Academy, 1798. Also 3 private English schools; a boarding-school for girls; French taught by various persons; singing by burgh music master; dancing classes in assembly room; Masonic lodges (1765, 1776, 1786). See also pp. 81, 252 foll. BALANTRAE, 5BI, Ballantrae, village. About 300 inhabitants

in 1791, depending on fisheries and smuggling—'a nest of smugglers' (Wight). Church built 1604, manse 1736; patron, laird of

Bargany. Free school endowed by local benefactor.

BARR, 5DH, hamlet. About 80 inhabitants, including 2 millers, 4 blacksmiths, 12 weavers, 6 masons, 3 carpenters, 2 shoemakers, 5 tailors, 5 innkeepers, in the hamlet and other parts of the parish. Parish erected 1653, patron, the Crown.

BARRHILL, hamlet in Colmonell parish, v. Bar Hill castle ruins,

5CI. Monthly services by Colmonell parish minister.

BEITH, 2DB, town. 1754 inhabitants in 1791. About 1730 linen trade declined, succeeded by trade in linen yarn; from 1777 to 1789 silk gauze manufactured on considerable scale; superseded by cotton weaving. In the town and parish were 2 candle works, 3 licensed distillers, 1 tobacco manufactory, 1 tan work, 1 malt

work, 4 corn mills, 5 lint mills, 1 wauk mill; 50 cotton spinners, 63 thread makers, 70 muslin weavers, 44 silk weavers, 32 woollen weavers, also tambourers; 9 cloth merchants; 18 grocers, 11 yarn merchants, a bookseller, 22 masons, 21 house carpenters, 2 saddlers, 29 shoemakers, 15 smiths, 4 coopers, 4 bakers, 13 tailors, 6 flax dressers, 4 stocking makers, 1 watchmaker, 2 barbers, 6 butchers, 1 hatter; 2 bankers, 2 surgeons, 1 druggist, 2 justices of the peace, 17 keepers of licensed public-houses, 24 carriers and carters. 3 principal fairs annually, weekly market on Friday. Glasgow-Ayr stagecoach passed thrice weekly. Church built 1593, aisle extended 1754, glebe exchanged for small farm 1727; patron, Earl of Eglinton. Anti-burgher church (1760) and Relief church (1784). Parish school, with 60 to 90 scholars, subsisised 3 small country schools; also 2 private schools in the town. 3 charitable societies, 2 of them formed 1772. Masonic lodge (1754).

CATRINE, in Sorn parish. A new town established 1787 by Claud Alexander of Ballochmyle and David Dale in association with their cotton works. From two or three thatched houses before 1787, growth till 1350 inhabitants in 1791, 1601 in 1793. 445 employed in cotton twist-mill, 200 in jeanie factory erected in 1790, 91 independent cotton weavers. Brewery established 1793. Also tradesmen: 3 blacksmiths, 6 carpenters, 7 masons, 7 tailors, 6 shoemakers, 1 dyer, 1 flax-dresser, 1 baker, 2 butchers, 2 sawers, 1 corn-miller, 15 day-labourers, 7 shopkeepers. 7 or 8 ale-houses. Chapel of Ease built 1793 by Claud Alexander; 273 Burghers and 37 Anti-burghers who worshipped at Cumnock and Auchinleck. School erected by cotton company, evening classes also provided. See also p. 51.

COLMONEL, 5BI, Colmonell, village. About 150 inhabitants in 1810. 7 weavers and various tradesmen in village. Tan works established c.1790. Parish church rebuilt 1772, manse built 1762; patron, laird of Bargany. Anti-burgher church (1755). Parish

school, remoter farmers hired tutor. CORSHOUSE, 2DD, Crosshouse, hamlet in Kilmaurs parish. School, but with minute stipend and post of teacher often vacant. COYLSTON, 4EF, Coylton, hamlet. 40 inhabitants in 1810. Church rebuilt 1776, manse built 1750, Crown as patron. Parish

school. Craigie, 4ED. No nucleated community. Parish church built 1776, manse built 1745, patronage passed c.1790 from Wallace to Campbells of Craigie. Parish school.

CROOKEDHOLM, 1ED, hamlet in Kilmarnock parish. Cameronian

congregation meeting-house built in 1785.

CROSSHILL, 3DG, hamlet in Kirkmichael parish.

Crosshouse, v. Corshouse.

CUMNOCK, 4FE, village in Old Cumnock parish. 580 inhabitants in 1765, 787 in 1791. Burgh of barony. Cotton and woollen weaving, shoemaking, tanning, dyeing. No regular market. Cumnock Social Depository, a charitable society. Parish church rebuilt 1754, manse c.1750; patron, Earl of Dumfries. Burgher church (1775); Anti-burghers went to Wallacetown, Auchinleck parish, just across the river. Parish school. Masonic lodge (1780). Cumnock, New, v. New Cumnock.

170 inhabitants in 1791 Woollens DAILLY, 5CH, village, produced domestically. In the village and other parts of the parish: 5 shopkeepers, 18 alehouse-keepers, 11 blacksmiths (including 4 apprentices), 16 masons, 22 carpenters and joiners (including 7 apprentices), 26 weavers, 9 shoemakers (including 1 apprentice), 20 tailors (including 1 apprentice), 1 butcher and baker, 3 millers, 12 gardeners (including 4 apprentices), 2 dyers (including 1 apprentice), 1 milliner, 2 coopers (including 1 apprentice), 1 stocking weaver, 1 flax dresser, 1 tanner. In 1695 parish church transferred from Old Dailly, rebuilt 1766, manse built 1758; patron, the Crown. Parish school.

DALGARVEN, 2CC, hamlet in Kilwinning parish.

DALMELLINTON, 4EG, Dalmellington, village. About 500 inhabitants in 1791. 7 fairs annually. Parish church rebuilt

on new site 1766; patron, the Crown. Parish school.

DALRY, 2CC, village. 814 inhabitants in 1791. Over 100 silk weavers, reduced by 1791 to 36, plus 8 women assistants; and cotton the chief trade with 107 weavers plus 127 women and children assistants; other 50 worked at spinning. Church rebuilt 1771, manse 1766; patron, Blair of Blair. Also Burgher and Anti-burgher churches. New school and schoolhouse built 1790; also a private school in village and several in country.

DALRYMPLE, 3DF, village. 200 inhabitants in 1811, Parish church rebuilt 1764, manse 1728; patron, the Crown. Parish

school, attended by Robert Burns.

DARVELL, 1FD, Darvel, village in Loudoun parish. Established 1752 by Earl of Loudoun, about 400 inhabitants by 1791.

58 cotton weavers. Cameronian congregation.

DREGHORN, 2DD, hamlet. 60 inhabitants in 1810. A few woollen weavers, 3 ale-houses. Parish church rebuilt 1780, manse 1789; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. School. Dreghorn was

the 'Dalmailing' of the Annals of the Parish.

DUNDONALD, 3DD, village. 200 inhabitants in 1810. Cotton carding works employing 30 persons; 6 weavers, 3 tailors, 4 shoemakers, 2 masons, 4 joiners, 3 smiths. Parish church not rebuilt till 1803, manse rebuilt 1784; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. Parish school, plus two private schools in other parts of parish. DUNLOP, 2DC, village. 112 inhabitants in 1791. 6 masons, 12 weavers, 6 carpenters, 3 smiths, 3 shoemakers, 4 tailors, 3 innkeepers in village and elsewhere in parish. Parish church rebuilt c.1766; patron, Earl of Eglinton. School, erected 1641.

FAIL, hamlet in Tarbolton parish.

FAIRLEY, 2CB, Fairlie, village in Largs parish. 132 inhabitants in 1791. 1 tailor, 6 weavers, 4 carpenters, 1 smith, 1 cooper, 2 shoemakers, 5 sailors; 3 alehouses, 1 inn. Village school. FENNICK, 1EC, Fenwick, village. Altogether 250 inhabitants in 1810. Besides the kirk-toun, in which shoemaking the principal trade, Fenwick-town which increased with weaving. 46 muslin weavers, 16 shoemakers, 5 tailors, 3 wrights, 3 coopers, 1 flax-dresser, 9 masons, 2 malt-men, in villages and elsewhere in parish. Church not rebuilt since 1643, manse rebuilt 1783; patron, Earl of Glasgow. Burgher meeting house (1784), also some Antiburghers and Cameronians. School, rebuilt 1782. For Fenwick Weavers' Society, see p. 86 foll.

FULLARTON, part of Irvine in the parish of Dundonald. Burghal charter 1707. Grew up after 1750, mainly occupied by sailors. GALSTON, 1FD, village. 455 inhabitants in 1779, 573 in 1791. 7 day-labourers, 3 carters, 9 masons, 55 weavers, 11 wrights, 11 stocking weavers, 11 tailors, 2 coopers, 2 carriers, 2 butchers, 24 tambourers, 5 grocers, 21 shoemakers, 4 lint millers, 7 colliers, 1 gardener, 1 mole-catcher, 1 baker, 3 paper makers, 2 dyers, 4 sempstresses, 2 horse dealers, 4 blacksmiths, 1 drummer, 2 flax-dressers, 1 surgeon, 1 druggist, 1 schoolmaster. 5 or 6 alehouses. Shoemaking, sold in Kilmarnock, for export; superseded by weaving of lawn and gauze, the first loom 'for silk or light work' set up in 1787. Church pre-Reformation, manse built 1727; patron, laird of Cessnock. Burgher church (1798). Parish school built c.1790. Sunday school erected by Miss Scott in 1787. 2 Masonic lodges (1748, 1772).

GIRVAN, 5BH, town. 1012 inhabitants in 1791, population having doubled in 50 or 60 years. Small harbour, fishing and smuggling; cotton weaving introduced c.1790 and rapidly increased; 200 handicraftsmen, 9 shopkeepers, 22 sailors, 8 inn and tavern-keepers, 153 servants, 49 day-labourers, 3 surgeons and apothecaries in the town and elsewhere in the parish. Parish church, Crown the patron. Parish school. In 1785 Girvan established as functioning burgh of barony, governed by 2 bailies and council of 10, with Hamilton of Bargany as superior. Masonic lodge (1772).

GREENOCK, 4GE, Townhead of Greenock, hamlet in Muirkirk

parish.

IRVINE, 2DD, royal burgh. About 3500 inhabitants in 1791. Of the Incorporated Trades there were 116 weavers, 56 shoemakers, 24 smiths, 27 tailors, 7 coopers, 80 masons and wrights. Also in the burgh and neighbourhood 10 maltsters, 6 master butchers, 7 bakers, 6 cloth merchants, 2 chandlers, 1 physician, 3 surgeons, 5 writers, 2 saddlers, 2 druggists, 3 coppersmiths, 4 tinkers, 6 barbers, 150 coalhewers, 60 carters, 8 carriers, 3 master shipbuilders. Besides shipbuilding, a tan work, a rope work, a bleach-

field, a whisky still, a small brewery, a tambour work employing 70 girls, a spinning jenny established c.1790 employing 80. and two others in the suburbs. Cotton weaving introduced and rapid increase in numbers employed. Many young men became sailors or emigrated to America and West Indies. 51 vessels belonged to port, navigated by 305 Irvine sailors. Chief trade was export of coal; also import and export business handled for Paisley and Glasgow, though superseded after dredging of Clyde. Stagecoach to Greenock twice weekly; fly to Glasgow twice weekly. Church of Irvine rebuilt on new site, 1774; patron, Earl of Eglinton. Relief Church 1773, involved in Buchanite schism 1783-4. Burghers had supply of sermon from 1792. Grammar school, which until American independence often had a score of boarders from America and West Indies, as well as 30 local pupils; also English school with 70 pupils; several private schools. Masonic lodge (1770). John Galt born 1779; see his novel, The Provost, for a picture of Irvine. See also p. 55.

KILBIRNY, 2DB, Kilbirnie, village. 300 inhabitants in 1791, compared with only 3 houses c.1750. Cotton weaving. Pre-Reformation church; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. Parish

KILBRIDE, 2BC, West Kilbride, village. 250 inhabitants in 1810. In the village and parish were 17 linen, 19 cotton and 2 silk weavers, 2 joiners, 3 blacksmiths, 2 shoemakers, 5 tailors. Parish church and manse both out of date; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. KILMARNOCK, 1ED, town. The biggest town in the county, with 5670 inhabitants in 1791, a rapid growth from about 2500 in mid-century. 5 Incorporated Trades: bonnet-makers (incorp. 1646), skinners, tailors, shoemakers, weavers. The old woollen trade expanded, with manufacture of carpets, blankets, plaidings, bonnets, stockings, etc.; expansion of leather trade, making boots, shoes and other leather work; c.1790 cotton spinning, weaving and calico printing introduced; miscellaneous other manufactures, including snuff and candles. For fuller details, see page 53 foll. 50 inns and ale-houses, exclusive of spirit shops. Daily mail-coach from Glasgow to Ayr; Glasgow-Carlisle coach, p. 1787. Parish church (Laigh Kirk) joined by another (High Kirk) about 1731; patron, the Earl of Glencairn. Of the 6776 inhabitants in the parish, 5716 belonged to the Established Church, 540 to the Burgher Church (est. 1772), 480 to the Anti-burgher Church (est. 1775) and 40 Cameronians, meeting at Crookedholm. Grammar school rebuilt 1751, English school and several private John Wilson's printing works established c.1780. Kilmarnock was a burgh of barony: 1592 charter to Lord Boyd renewed by 1672 charter to Earl of Kilmarnock giving him superiority over the burgh, which transferred in 1749 to Earl of Glencairn when he purchased Kilmarnock estates. In 1764 Glencairn refused to accept magistratea as nominated by Council,

but Court of Session (1771) guaranteed the burgh's independence. During this period Glencairn laid out new street from Kilmarnock to Riccarton (1765). In 1786 Miss Scott acquired Kilmarnock estates from Glencairn. 3 Masonic lodges (1734, 1767, 1771). KILMAURS, 2EC, village. 514 inhabitants in 1791. 3 cottonspinners, 21 shoemakers, 4 tailors, 9 masons, 6 wrights, 9 weavers, 2 smiths, 11 colliers, 1 cooper, 4 tinkers, 1 stocking-weaver, 1 fiddler, 16 day-labourers, 3 journeymen weavers, 2 journeymen shoemakers, 1 flax-dresser, 1 watchmaker, 20 apprentices, 1 woman servant, 1 schoolmaster, 1 teacher—all in the town. Parish church; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. First Secession church in Ayrshire established in Kilmaurs 1740 (v. Secession congregations for details). Parish school. Universal Society of Kilmaurs, benefit society, formed 1781. Kilmaurs burgh of barony, charter 1527, allocated the land of the burgh to 40 portioners, who elected a council, which had few powers.

KILWINNING, 2DC, town. 1260 inhabitants in 1791. customary weavers, 56 silk weavers, 146 muslin weavers, 24 tambourers, 7 seamstresses, 12 smiths, 6 shoemakers, 9 masons, 10 tailors, 3 coopers, 24 carpenters, 4 millwrights, 2 wheelwrights, 3 butchers, 2 bakers, 1 surgeon, 2 writers, 1 slater, 1 barber, 1 dyer, 2 tanners, 2 chandlers, 1 clockmaker, 13 public-houses, 11 shopkeepers, 3 ship masters, 11 seamen, 12 soldiers, 2 carriers, 9 carters, 37 day-labourers—most of these in the town. There were several factory establishments, a linen manufactory, and c.1790 a tannery, 2 cotton spinning houses, and a cotton carding mill were opened. Church, with manse built in 1773; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. Anti-burgher church established 1758. Parish school. 3 charitable societies. Mother Lodge Kilwinning (1599).

KIRKMICHAEL, 3DG, hamlet. 100 inhabitants in 1810. In the parish were 20 woollen weavers, 14 carpenters, 6 blacksmiths, 3 shoemakers, 4 tailors, 3 masons. Church rebuilt 1787; patron,

the Crown. Parish school.

KIRK OSWALDS. 3CG, Kirkoswald, hamlet. 100 inhabitants in 1810, only 17 families in 1791. In the parish, besides farmers, etc., 16 weavers, 6 blacksmiths, 5 cartwrights, 5 joiners, 6 shoemakers, 4 tailors, 1 grocer. Blankets and plaidings woven throughout the parish; c.1790 thread mill, and wool carding and spinning machines erected. Parish church rebuilt on new site 1777; patron, the Crown. Parish school, attended by Robert Burns. A diligence thrice weekly between Ayr and Portpatrick changed horses here; riding post from Ayr to Girvan daily; 2 carriers from Girvan to Ayr weekly, 1 carrier from Girvan to Glasgow weekly.

LARGS, 2BB, village. 502 inhabitants in 1791. 70 weavers, 13 carpenters, 7 cordwainers, 8 tailors, 6 smiths, 6 coopers, 5 masons, 7 sailors, 2 butchers, 1 innkeeper, 4 ale-house keepers, 2 carriers, 1 suregon. Silk-weaving; salmon and other fishing. Weekly market on Thursdays; annual fair each second Tuesday in June -Colm's Day-and lasted from Monday to Thursday. Pre-Reformation church; patron, laird of Skelmorlie. Burgher congregation (1779). Parish school, 60 to 70 scholars. Masonic lodge (1767).

LOANS, 3DD, hamlet in Dundonald parish. Involved in

smuggling trade.

LOCHRIGG, 2DB, hamlet in Kilbirnie parish. Coal pit with a

fire engine and a dozen miners.

LOUDOUNKIRK, hamlet in Loudoun parish. Possibly established in 18th century by Earl of Loudoun beside the old Kirk of Loudoun.

The parish centre was Newmilns (q.v.).

MACHLINE, 4FE, Mauchline, town. 1000 inhabitants in 1791 10 merchants, 20 weavers, 20 masons, 12 wrights and carpenters, 2 tanners, 12 shoemakers, 10 tailors, 2 butchers, 4 hosiers, 1 saddler, 6 smiths, 2 messengers or king's bailiffs, 3 sheriff officers, 2 writers or attorneys, 1 surgeon, 1 minister. Pre-Reformation church manse built 1730; patron, the Earl of Loudoun. Burgher church (1796). Parish school built 1789, replacing schoolroom in church; other two private schools besides others in the country. Machlin Friendly Society established c.1780. Masonic lodge (1791). See also p. 70.

MAYBOLE, 3DG, town. About 1200 inhabitants in 1791 Woollen manufacture, nearly 80 looms weaving blankets, nearly 300 weavers; cotton weaving initiated c.1790, with 24 looms, Four annual wool fairs. Parish church built c.1755; patron, the Crown. Burgher church (1798). Parish school, 'an old mean thatched house.' Burgh of barony (est. 1516) with 17 councillors elected from leet presented by Earl of Cassillis. Masonic lodges

(1736, 1797).

MIDDLETON, 2CB, hamlet in Dalry parish, now part of the town. MONKTON, 3DE, hamlet. 100 inhabitants in 1810. 2 housewrights, 2 cart and plough wrights, 1 weaver, 1 mason, 4 shoemakers, 1 blacksmith, 2 tailors, 1 cooper, 1 excise officer, 2 tobacco manufacturers, 5 public-houses. Pre-Reformation parish church; patron, the laird of Adamton. Parish school, 40 scholars. Masonic lodge (1762).

MUIRKIRK, 4HD, village. About 1000 inhabitants in 1810, rapid growth from hamlet size with the establishment of iron works 1787, first furnace blown 1789. Parish church repaired 1775; patron, Earl of Loudoun. Parish school, with 30 pupils in summer,

40 in winter. 2 Masonic lodges (1734, 1798).

NEW CUMNOCK, 4GF, village. 350 inhabitants in 1810. Besides village near the church, another on Afton Water by 1791. First parish church built 1659; patron, Earl of Dumfries. Parish school, with 30 to 40 scholars.

NEW MILLS, 1FD, Newmilns, town. About 1000 inhabitants in 1791. 241 male and 25 female weavers, engaged in cotton trade. Loudoun parish church, rebuilt 1738, manse rebuilt 1768; patron, the Earl of Loudoun. Anti-burgher church established 1773. Parish school, 'one of the best in the west country,' with always over 60, often 90 scholars. Friendly Society for relief of poor. Burgh of barony (est. 1491) and regality (1707), with two bailies, chancellor, treasurer, fiscal, and 13 councillors. Masonic

lodge (1754).

NEWTON-UPON-AYR, 3DE, also Town Plan; town (not named). About 600 inhabitants in 1750, 1600 in 1778, 1689 in 1791. 101 weavers, 25 wrights, 24 carpenters, 10 shoemakers, 14 shipmasters, 51 sailors, 8 smiths, 7 stocking weavers, 2 coopers, 4 bakers, 22 fishermen (salmon and herring), 26 white fishers, 12 herring fishers, 24 colliers, 57 day-labourers (mostly at the pits), 3 clothiers or dyers, 11 chapmen (mainly Irish), 10 ropemakers, 5 tinkers and horners, 7 masons, 9 carriers, 5 land labourers, 59 female servants, 3 male servants, 3 schoolmasters, 3 Customs officers, 5 Excise officers, 6 grocers, 2 carters, 2 tanners, 3 curriers, 4 skinners, 2 clockmakers, 2 toll-gatherers, 1 butcher, 1 barber, 1 gardener, 1 miller, 1 heelmaker, 1 maltman, 1 gunsmith, 1 messenger-at-arms, 1 musician, 1 drummer, 17 public-houses. Chapel of Ease established 1777, disjoined from Monkton in 1779 and became Newton parish church, manse built 1787; patron, the Council and Kirk Session. 40 Anti-burghers worshipped in Wallacetown, 20 Episcopalians in Ayr, also a few of other denominations. Parish school, with 40 to 50 scholars; also private schools; some attended school in Ayr. Burgh of barony (est. 1306-71), with 48 burgess tenementers who every two years chose 2 bailies, 1 treasurer, and 6 councillors, and had occasional meetings of all burgesses. 2 Masonic lodges (1771, a.1802). See also p. 254 foll. OCHILTREE, 4FE, village. About 270 inhabitants in 1791. A few shopkeepers, masons, joiners and weavers. Parish church rebuilt 1789, foundation stone laid by James Boswell; patron, Countess of Glencairn. Parish school and several private ones. Old Cunnock, v. Cunnock.

OLD DAILY, 5CH, Old Dailly, hamlet in Dailly parish. Parish church removed from Old Dailly to New Dailly in 1695.

PORTING CROSS, 2BB, Portineross, hamlet in West Kilbride

parish. Fishing trade in decay.

PRIESTWICK, 3DE, Prestwick, village in the parish of Monkton and Prestwick. 266 inhabitants in 1791. 16 weavers, 2 stocking-makers, 4 wrights, 1 mason, 1 blacksmith, 2 public-houses. Pre-Reformation Kirk of Prestwick, served by the minister of Monkton (q.v.), with services every third Sunday, till 1779 when Newton disjoined, then services here suspended. Burgh of barony (est. 1165-1173), with 36 freemen tenementers electing provost, 2 bailies and councillors.

RICCARTOUN, 1ED, Riccarton, village. 372 inhabitants in 1791. Shoemakers and weavers. Parish church rebuilt 1772,

manse rebuilt c.1790; patron, the laird of Caprington. Parish school. Masonic lodge (1768-1799).

RUMFORD, hamlet in Dundonald parish. 74 inhabitants in

1791. Also known as 'Old Rome.'

ST. QUIVOX, 3DE, village. 150 inhabitants in 1810. Parish church repaired 1767, aisle added by Oswald of Auchencruive; patron, laird of Auchencruive. Parish school built c.1785.

SALTCOATS, 2CC, town in Ardrossan and Stevenston parishes. 2325 inhabitants in 1791. Harbour built c.1700 and later extended, with increased export of coal to Ireland from Auchenharvie and Ardeer, esp. after opening of Saltcoats Canal 1772. In 1775 shipbuilding and associated ropeworks established. 41 vessels, with 320 men, belonged to the port. Also salmon and herring fishing. Salt-making; weaving of woollens, linen, silk and cotton; weaving of nets; some shoemakers; brewery; distillery c.1785 for a few years. 1 small annual fair. Ardrossan parish church transferred from Castle Hill to Saltcoats 1744, new church damaged in storm and rebuilt 1774; manse rebuilt c.1790; patron, the Earl of Eglinton. Relief church (1782), Burgher church (1792), Anti-burgher church (1800). Parish school, rebuilt c.1790. Burgh of barony, but not functioning. 'Saltcoats is the principal watering-place of Ayrshire. From 300 to 500 people usually resort there, during the summer months, from the inland country, especially from the towns of Paisley, Glasgow and Hamilton' (Stat. Acct., VII, 8).

SHEWALTON, hamlet in Dundonald parish.

SIMONTON, 3DD, Symington, village. 204 inhabitants in 1791. 5 smiths, 1 mason, 3 wrights, 10 weavers, 7 shoemakers, 5 tailors, 2 millers, 1 cooper, 1 hosier, 2 ale-houses, in village and other parts of parish. Pre-Reformation church, repaired c.1750, manse built 1786; patron, Earl of Eglinton. Parish school built 1788, 40 to 50 scholars.

SORN, 4FE, village. (Parish church and parish name shown.) 191 inhabitants in 1791. c.1775 Dr. Stevenson, proprietor of Dalgain, established the village of Dalgain or Sorn. 3 shopkeepers, 3 innkeepers, 3 masons, 7 shoemakers, 5 weavers, 5 tailors, 4 seamstresses, 7 colliers. Parish church built 1656, manse built 1692; patron, laird of Sorn. Parish school and dwelling-house 'among the most wretched that are to be found in any cultivated country,' about 25 to 20 scholars.

STAIR, 4EE, hamlet. Parish church repaired c.1790; no manse, the parish minister, Rev. John Steel, residing at Gadgirth;

patron, Earl of Stair. No school.

STEUARTOUN, 2EC, Stewarton, town. 1300 inhabitants in 1791. Chief trade was bonnet-making, supplying all parts of Scotland, also exporting French or Quebec caps; there was a Bonnet-makers' guild. Also 100 to 130 weavers. 1 writer and 1 surgeon in the town. Parish church rebuilt 1772, manse built

1642; patron, laird of Lainshaw. Anti-burgher church (1775). Parish school and 2 subsidised country schools; 2 private schools in town. David Dale born here, son of a grocer, 1739. Masonic lodge (1771).

STEVENSTOUN, 2CC, Stevenston, town. 1019 inhabitants in 1791. More than 200 persons employed in coal-mining in and around Stevenston town. Linen, silk and cotton-weaving; cotton spinning jeanies introduced into the parish c.1791; a bleachfield in the town. Parish church built c.1670, with aisle added c.1745, manse rebuilt c.1790; vice-patrons, lairds of Seabank and Grange. Parish school, 'old and inconvenient,' with 50 scholars; 2 or 3 other private schools in the parish. Masonic lodge (1787).

STRAITON, 3EG, village. 186 inhabitants in 1791. Village laid out by Thomas, Earl of Cassillis, c.1760. In the village and elsewhere in the parish: 4 shoemakers, 3 tailors, 4 masons, 4 blacksmiths, 2 millers, 3 joiners, 2 cartwrights, 1 butcher, 1 baker, 12 weavers (not including journeymen and apprentices) producing woollens, c.1790 mostly transferred to muslins. 2 inns and 4 ale-houses in the village. Until c.1790 many smugglers. Pre-reformation parish church, extended 1759, manse built 1753; patron, the Crown. Parish school.

TARBOLTON, 4EE, village. 450 inhabitants in 1791. Stockingmakers. Parish church; manse rebuilt c.1790; patron, laird of Coilsfield. Burgher church (1777). Parish school. Burgh of barony (est. 1671). Universal Friendly Society of Tarbolton. 2 Masonic lodges (1771, 1773).

Townhead of Greenock, v. Greenock.

WALLACETOWN, 3DE, also Town Plan, town in St. Quivox parish (indicated but not named). 960 inhabitants in 1791. A new town established c. 1760 by Sir Thomas Wallace of Craigie. Colliers, lime-burners, weavers, mechanics, dealers in grain, meal and malt. Served by St. Quivox parish church, 3 miles to the east; after 1777 Newton-upon-Ayr church closely adjacent. Anti-burgher church (1770); burgher church (1799). No record of a school. See also p. 255 foll.

Archibald, 11th Earl: born 1726, educated with elder brother at Irvine, Haddington, then to Eton before Winchester, and studied abroad; army service, in 1757 raised 78th Regt. of Highlanders, and as their Lt. Col. fought against Cherokee Indians in America; 1761 elected M.P. for Ayrshire and Wigtown Burghs, choosing to serve as member for Ayrshire; after elevation, chosen as Representative Peer 1776 onwards; also various military posts, reaching rank of General; patron of Robert Burns; appointed Lord Lieutenant 1794; continued brother's agrarian improvements, with Fairlie of Fairlie as factor, later William Ralston (Stat. Acct., IX, 365); twice married, two daughters by second wife, whom he divorced; died aged 73; title and half of the lands went to his cousin, remaining lands to eldest daughter, Lady Mary Montgomerie, who married eldest son of 12th Earl, so reuniting lands later.

Colonel Hugh Montgomerie of Coylfield and Skelmorlie, born 1739, entered army in 1756 and saw service in America; M.P. Ayrshire 1784 till 1789 when resigned on appointment as Inspector of Military Roads in Scotland; raised West Lowland Fencibles and Glasgow Fencibles in 1793; re-elected M.P. Ayrshire 1796 but almost immediately succeeded to earldom; elected Representative Peer 1798 till 1806 created Peer of the United Kingdom with the title Baron Ardrossan; soon after accession he rebuilt Eglinton Castle, laid out roads, and extended and beautified policies; he established the new town and harbour of Ardrossan in 1806, and planned a Glasgow to Ardrossan ship canal; Lord Lieutenant of Ayrshire, State Counsellor for Scotland to the Prince Regent, Knight of the Thistle, his interests ranged from music to the turf; none of his three sons survived him, the eldest, Archibald Lord Montgomerie, born 1773, became a Major General in 1809 and died 1814: Archibald's fourth and only surviving son, born 1812, was brought up by his grandfather, whom he succeeded at the age of seven, in 1819.

Hugh Logan, born 1739, the "Laird of Logan," a celebrated wit: "The personal appearance of our Laird was extremely prepossessing. His stature was tall, and his form remarkably handsome; while his frank and open countenance was lighted up by eyes, black, full of penetration, and highly expressive of the character we have given of him. In youth his hair was light, but as he advanced in life he became bald, and in his latter years wore a wig assimilating to the colour of his eyes. His weight varied from eighteen to twenty stones. Though not fastidious about his clothes, he was always appropriately dressed, wearing generally a blue or brown coat, with light-coloured shorts, having buckles at the knees. In respect to morals, the conduct of Logan may, by many, be regarded in

a great measure unexceptionable; and, what is perhaps not a little singular, considering his associates and the scenes of dissipation in which he but too frequently mingled, only one instance of an illicit amour has been laid to his charge—the offspring of which is, we believe, at present living in Cumnock, and is remarked for the striking resemblance she bears to her distinguished parents." (J. D. Carrick, 10). Among his associates were his former Edinburgh schoolmates, Hugh Montgomerie of Coilsfield, later Earl of Eglinton, and John Hamilton of Sundrum. Reduced by the Ayr Bank crash and by convival living, Logan was in 1798 compelled to sell almost all the estate, and removed to Wellwood, where he died 1802.

CANAL, 2CC, the Saltcoats Canal in Stevenston parish; 21 miles long, 12 feet wide, 4 feet deep, opened 19th September, 1772, to carry coals from Seabank and Ardeer to Saltcoats harbour; shares with the Monkland Canal the honours of 'first in Scotland.' Stat. Acct., VII, 15.

COAL PITTS, 4DE, also Ayr Town Plan, in Newton-upon-Ayr.

COAL PITTS, 3DC, in Dailly parish. Coal had been worked here at least since 1560 (Charters of Crosraguel, I, lxi, 122); 18th century developments were limited by transport difficulties.

Coal indicated by symbol, 2CC, in Stevenston parish. The coal of Seabank and Ardeer was exploited by Robert Cuninghame of Auchenharvie from the end of the 17th century and further by his successor Robert Reid Cuninghame after 1770.

The small cylinder of it was brought from London, only 18 inches in diameter (Stat. Acct., VII, 11). A larger engine of 38 inches cylinder was installed in 1732 (New Stat. Acct., V, 441) and a still larger one in 1784 (V, 444).

ENGINE, 3DE, also Ayr Town Plan, in Newton-upon-Ayr.

This engine was of 14 inch bore (Stat. Acct., II, 270).

FINE QUARRIES, 2CC, in Stevenston parish. A variety of minerals was quarried in Stevenston (Stat. Acct., VII, 8), so that this may not be a mere engraver's error for lime quarries.

FORGE, 4GE, ruins in Muirkirk parish. Lord Catheart and others c.1753 began mining ore, transporting it to Bunawe in Argyllshire for smelting, and making bar iron with the pig iron when it was returned; work was abandoned due to

transport expenses (Aiton, 603).

IRON MINE, 4FE, in Muirkirk parish. Probably associated with the ruined Forge (q.v.); iron-mining was extended with the establishment of the Muirkirk Iron Works in 1787.

LEAD MINES, 4FF, in New Cumnock parish. 'There is now a lead-mine working in Afton barony, about 3 miles S.W. from the church, in which a company of Quakers have entered into a contract. Twenty miners are employed, and more are expected according to the apparent success.' Written c.1793 Stat. Acct., VI, 99).

Cameron, the Covenanter, was killed at the skirmish of Airds Moss, 22nd July, 1680, and his trunk buried here, his head and hands being carried to Edinburgh to win the reward offered of five thousand merks. MONUMENT, 4EE, at Coylfield estate, Tarbolton parish. "Within the beautifully ornamental grounds which surround the house of Coilsfield are a scene, which the tradition of the country relates to have been a field of battle; and a stone held in veneration as the monument of old King Coil. It may more probably have been the scene of a battle between the Danish invaders, and the old Gaelic inhabitants of the country. The rude stone may have been originally placed to cover the body of some chieftain, although not that of him to whom it is ascribed " (Stat. Acct., XIX, 457).

MONUMENT, 3DE, Macrae Monument in Monkton parish. James McCrae, born Ochiltree, orphan befriended by Hugh McQuyre (violer in Ayr), went to sea, made fortune in India, where Governor of Fort St. George, returned and bought estates in Kent and Ayrshire, including Orangefield 1734: presented Glasgow with statue of William III in 1734; lent Glasgow £1500 to make up sum levied by Prince Charles 1745; repaid McQuyre (or McGuire) by gifts to his family (v. Drumdow, Orangefield, Ochiltree estates); died in or before 1748, in which year monument erected, collapsed 1749, rebuilt 1750 (Kyle, 596-598; Murdoch, Ochiltree, Ch. IX).

OBELISK, 3EG, in Straiton parish. Erected on Benan Hill by

Sir John Whitefoord (Stat. Acct., III, 586).

Miscellanea.

Bailiaries: CARRICK, KYLE AND CUNNINGHAM. The County of Ayr was divided into three bailiaries with the Rivers Doon and Irvine forming the boundaries, while Kyle was itself divided into Kyle Stewart (north) and Kyle Regis (south) along the Ayr-Lugar river boundary.

> Kyle for a man, Carrick for a coo. Cunningham for butter and cheese And Galloway for 'oo'.

Various versions of this ancient rhyme, whose origin is unknown, are given in Finlayson, Anthology of Carrick, 1925. The traditional spelling of the northern bailiary was Cuninghame, e.g. Cuninghame Topographized by Timothy Pont, c.1600, various editions; in Blaeu's Atlas, 1654, it appears both as Cuninghamia and as Cunningham, which latter anglicised form has been frequent since; the intermediate form of Cunninghame is also occasionally found. The bailiaries ceased to have any significance after the abolition of heritable jurisdictions in 1747.
